PROVIDENCE EXTENSION PROGRAM -- JACKSONVILLE COURSE INFORMATION WESTERN THOUGHT I

Course Description: This course accompanies the Ancient History and the Ancient Literature and Composition Core Courses. This interdisciplinary course in Western Thought is designed to give the student: 1) an understanding of the historical continuity and progress of Western Thought and its role in the development of the Christian world view, 2) an adequate and logical defense for the hope they have within them, and 3) the ability to take the truth of Christianity into various disciplines. This is the first year of a three-year course of study. In this year, study representative works from Ancient Greece, Rome, and Early Christendom.

Realistic Expectations for this class: This is a 10th grade level class on the level of an Honors class. I expect that you will need to spend **90 minutes per day** on this course. **If you are a highly motivated student or you are not a fast reader, you may need to spend more time on this class.** If you allow yourself to get behind, it will be extremely difficult for you to catch up.

- This is a Biblical worldview class. We will not only discuss and write about the assigned literature, but also how the issues presented relate to the Bible and to our world.
- Course work assignments are to be turned in **on time**, **complete**, **and well done**, **in hard copy**, **and handed in to the tutor**. Late or incomplete work is penalized.
- Assignments must be **legible.** They may be handwritten, provided that the penmanship of the student can be easily read. Penalties will be assessed, up to and including a zero for the assignment if the tutor cannot easily read the assignment.
- Essays are to be **typed and as free as possible from spelling, grammatical, and stylistic errors.** While this is not an English composition class *per se*, an important part of our philosophy of instruction is that the content and disciplines taught in each Core class are reinforced in the other Core classes.
- Students are to come to class *prepared*. Students may not be excused from class to retrieve assignments or books that they have forgotten!
- Students are to arrive at class *on time*. If timeliness becomes a problem, quizzes will be given and students arriving late because of socializing or lack of preparation will receive a zero on the quiz and will not be able to retake the quiz at another time.

Goals and Objectives for this class:

Students will:

- Discuss Biblical worldview issues and examine the worldviews presented in each written work.
- Analyze written texts based on their views of God, origins, man, ethics, evil, death, and the meaning of history.
- Compare and contrast the analysis described above with the Biblical revelation on these issues.
- Be able to communicate this information in verbal and written form.
- Be able to articulate their own worldview.
